I appreciate Jessica Phillips, MAS, BSN, RNC-OB, C-EFM, C-ONQS, TETAF/Texas Perinatal Services perinatal program director, and Natalie Frost, M.D., FAAP, an Austin-based neonatologist, for each giving a full day, patiently waiting to provide expert testimony at the Capitol. I was there with both of them on different days and they provided remarkable testimony.

89th Legislative Session Update

The 89th Texas Legislative Session is more than halfway complete. This week, the House passed Senate Bill (SB) 1, the budget bill, out of the House Appropriations Committee. Included in the budget were continued funding for trauma with an ongoing focus on rural health and funding for maternal mortality and morbidity. The Senate passed SB 1 last week and now the House will take up the bill on the floor next week.

TETAF Advocacy Committee and team remain focused on the TETAF Legislative Priorities and they are also focused on a

number of other important legislative items, including:

- During the 88th Legislative Session, the Senate appropriated funds for a \$50 million Rural
 Hospital Grant Program. Last month, the House adopted an addition of "trauma, maternal,
 and neonatal designation-related expenses" as a category of expense for the Rural Hospital
 Grant Program. This is a result of a rider that TETAF submitted and Rep. Donna Howard (DAustin) filed.
- HB 37 (Rep. Mihaela Plesa, D-Plano) Rep. Plesa filed a committee substitute to HB 37, now titled "relating to perinatal bereavement care provided by certain hospitals, a perinatal bereavement care initiative, and a perinatal bereavement care hospital recognition program." TETAF met with Rep. Plesa and other legislative leaders to discuss the legislation to ensure it is not overly burdensome to maternal facilities while recognizing the good intent Rep. Plesa has in ensuring that all maternal facilities have access to a perinatal palliative care cooling device and bereavement care. It is intended that grant dollars would be made available so that hospitals could receive the perinatal palliative care cooling device and additional bereavement care education. On March 25, Jessica Phillips, perinatal program director for TETAF/Texas Perinatal Services, testified during the House Public Health Committee hearing. The bill is pending in the committee.
- SB 1233 (Sen. Kelly Hancock, R-North Richland Hills)/HB 2684 (Rep. Valoree Swanson, R-Spring) This bill is relating to information regarding perinatal palliative care; creating an administrative penalty. TETAF met with Sen. Hancock's staff to express concerns and recommended using the term "fetus" instead of "preborn child" and discussed that the term "life threatening disability" would not be inclusive of all conditions. TETAF will continue to work with Sen. Hancock and Rep. Swanson to discuss concerns.

TETAF/Texas Perinatal Services continue to hold its Legislative Work Group meetings to update stakeholders on legislative activity. The next meeting is **Friday**, **April 4 at 9:30 a.m. CDT.** If you would like to attend, <u>register here</u>.
